Use of Language	C2	The candidate has a good command of a very broad lexical repertoire including idiomatic expressions and colloquialisms; he/she maintains consistent grammatical control of complex language, even while attention is otherwise engaged.
	C1	The candidate has a good command of a broad lexical repertoire allowing gaps to be readily overcome with circumlocutions; little obvious searching for expressions or avoidance strategies. He/she consistently maintains a high degree of grammatical accuracy. Errors are rare and difficult to spot.
	B2	The candidate has a good range of vocabulary for matters connected to his/her field and most general topics. He/she shows a relatively high degree of grammatical control and does not make mistakes which lead to misunder-standing.
	B1	The candidate has enough language to get by, with sufficient vocabulary to express him/herself with some hesitation and circumlocutions on topics pertinent to his/her everyday life.
